


Be sure to renew your AMA Membership as soon as you can. Next months model magazines and this Newsletter will carry renewal applications for 1976.

It was another "Crash-o-rama Spectacular" performed during two foggy-muggy days at the Basin. 32 standard and 29 experts signed up for the predicted 10 rounds of the greatest competition anywhere. An excess of experts on 72.400 resulted in 3 plane heat; in that class. I wonder if everyone of these fellows are trying to avoid flying against Terry Prather. Charlie Smith and Kathy Smith (related) made up the heat cards and kept score while Len Katz did a beautiful job of managing the ready line and back up lines. He also called the action during the races via the public address, then promptly announced the results. Ron Schorr, Contest Director, kept things organized with only one re-fly to settle a protest. John Elgin helped with lap-counting. Valley Flyers were otherwise conspicuous for their absence from the working staff. However, some of the competitors who have learned to land properly and don't need the time between rounds for repairs, did get out to do some flagging. I didn't get all the names, but thanks to all that helped.

Scale judges took a pretty good look at the planes, including the UNDERNEATH side. The CD cautioned that models that bear numbers other that those of the flyer would be disqualified in the future. Also, because of the frequency conflict, it was announced that at the Whittier contest no more than 25 % of the entries would be accepted on any one frequency in one class. This will be handled on a first come-first served basis. There was an immediate demand for registeration forms.

This was the most interesting event that I have ever attended because Laird and I had the LOKI put together right this time. When flying broke-off Saturday afternoon we were only one point down and could begin to smell the hareware. The kid did real good but a couple of cuts and a flame-out drug us down. (The only advantage that I have found in being the editor of this Newsletter is that I can write about my kid.)

Ron Schorr did it up real nice for all the workers. He hosted a dinner party at his house for them Saturday. Guess everyone was able to hold their liquor because I didn't see any red-eyes the next morning.

I heard that there were 22 planes lost during the 2 days. Only a couple appeared to be radio-tpye problems. 5 mid-airs accounted for 10 planes. That means that about 1/3 of the planes entered were lost. Since I got pretty busy at the finish with minor repairs, preparing for a fifth place fly-off, then getting the camera set for the awards....my note-taking suffered.
